At the Annual General Meeting of the FISA, held on November 22, 2006, the membership approved the audited financial statement for 2005-06, the budget for 2006-2007, and the actions and decisions of the Board of Directors to date. ADMINISTERED GRANTS SERVICES OF FISA

The existence of the FISA and its credibility as the voice for independent schools in BC gives other agencies the confidence to use the FISA as the co-ordinating or distributing agency for grants they provide. The following were made available to independent schools in the 2005-06 school year.

FISA PRESIDENT'S REPORT November 22, 2006

The last temptation is the greatest treason: To do the right deed for the wrong reason.

STATISTICS:

In 2005-06, the total number of independent students was 66,235, an increase of 1,294 (increase of 1%). The total number of public school students continues to decline as predicted, estimated at 569,107. The FISA now represents 92% of the independent school enrolment in the province. Approximately 11% of the school-going children in the province now attend independent schools. Operational funding (50% and 35%) to independent schools has increased by approximately \$16 million since last year to \$193.4 million (\$171 million in per student operating grants to group 1 and 2 schools, \$6 million in operating grants to 10 DL schools, \$16 million in special education grants and \$400,000 to homeschoolers).

MINISTRY OF EDUCATION:

The FISA continues to develop and maintain a positive relationship with the Ministry on vital issues that affect independent schools. The FISA continues to receive recognition as the voice of independent schools, resulting in further gains in the areas of consultation, dialogue and finance. The work of the Federation over the past year can be diarized:

- October 2005: Establishment of Independent Schools BCeSIS group and iGroup
- November 2005: Initial discussions on the FISA membership requirements
- November 2005: Independent schools receive \$250,000 for Literacy Innovation
- January 2006: Mid-year Special Education funding applications introduced
- April 2006: Education (Learning Enhancement) Statutes Amendments Act – Bill 33
- July 2006: Minister of Education confirms rights of independent schools to teach curriculum from a faith-based perspective

 September 2006: The FISA invited to join Social Justice 12 curriculum writing team

- October 2006: The FISA invited to attend Premier's Teachers' Congress
- October 2006: BCCT invites the FISA to attend a dialogue re: Standards of the Teaching Profession
- November 2006: UBC School Leadership Centre invites dialogue with other stakeholders to address the induction, mentoring and succession of teachers new to the profession

The Federation, through its Executive Officers and Board of Directors continues to have very positive meetings with Minister of Education, Hon. Shirley Bond, Deputy Minister; Emery Dosdall, Lead Director Peter Owen; and the Inspector's Office: (Susan Penner, Ed Vanderboom, and Theo Vandeweg). These relationships are consultative with the sharing of ideas to provide a solid platform for the relationship between the Federation and the Ministry. My thanks go to each of the Board members for the roles that you play in fostering the mission of the Federation. In particular, I must once again thank Fred Herfst and Margaret Baldwin for the exemplary way that they execute their responsibilities.

SPECIAL EDUCATION FUNDING:

Subsequent to the Minister's announcement in September 2005, independent schools have had a year to adjust to full funding for those children with more significant special needs who are enrolled in independent schools. The process has been somewhat clarified and the addition of mid-year funding is appreciated. With increased funding comes increased accountability – both to the Ministry and to the students and their parents. This is to be expected. The FISA is constantly aware of the danger of increased control and governance, and the protection of independent school rights.

CORREN AND CORREN and MINISTRY OF EDUCATION:

In April 2006, the Ministry of Education signed an out-ofcourt settlement agreement with Peter and Murray Corren, thereby negating the need for the continuation of the formal hearing before the Human Rights Tribunal. The six-page agreement contains an explanation of the rights of public school parents with respect to alternate delivery, the description of the internal revision process guidelines that will be used as a framework when the Ministry reviews curriculum, the description of the new Social Justice 12 course, and the development of delivery guidelines for K-12 public schools.

In July 2006, in response to a letter from the FISA, the Minister of Education, Shirley Bond, confirmed that nothing in or flowing from the settlement agreement with the Correns will preclude group 1, 2 or 4 independent schools from teaching the curriculum from a faith-based perspective or would require them to teach learning outcomes that violate their religious faith.

BC COLLEGE OF TEACHERS:

The past year has seen the FISA/BCCT relationship strengthen with the involvement of the FISA in the continued development and re-writing of the BCCT Bylaws and revision of the *Standards for the Education, Competence and Professional Conduct of Educators in British Columbia*. In the Spring of 2006 a team of FISA representatives attended the Wosk Center for Dialogue for two days to discuss the standards. This dialogue was part of the original implementation process when the standards were developed, with the FISA's full participation, in 2003. The FISA was invited by the BCCT in October 2006 to provide them with a formal brief and the opportunity for a one-on-one discussion. In the early summer, Mr. Dalip Singh Gill of Dasmesh Punjabi School was appointed to the BCCT Council as the Minister's appointment.

MEMBERSHIP REQUIREMENTS:

After much discussion on this topic the FISA struck a subcommittee to review the membership requirements of the FISA Constitution. As a result, the subcommittee reported its findings to the Board of Directors at the April 26, 2006 meeting. The findings of the subcommittee

clarified the membership requirements and the conditions of membership. It also reviewed the philosophy of a member school. The board voted to take no action at this time.

STRATEGIC REVIEW:

At the FISA board meeting on September 27, 2006 the Board of Directors formally adopted *The Road Ahead* strategic planning document. This document was distributed to the five member associations in the early Spring of 2006 for review and feedback. The board members discussed the feedback received and formally accepted the document as the direction that the FISA would move in the next five to 10 years. The challenge we now face is the implementation of this strategic planning document. My sincere thanks go to the board members who developed the document, and in particular, Henry Contant who was the driving force leading to its successful completion and adoption.

FISA WEBSITE:


As part of The Road Ahead plan, the FISA has updated the Directory of Independent schools on the website (<u>www.fisabc.ca</u>) with active street and satellite maps. Each school was identified with a pushpin and a balloon descriptor that contains the member school information. The upgrade will continue to resolve the slowness of the loading of the satellite maps and will include modifications to the database of schools and additional information that can be actively searched.

INDEPENDENT SCHOOLS ACT:

The revised Independent Schools Act Regulations and Orders were released in July 2006. The revisions are many, and have been explained at the regional tour of meetings throughout the province. Copies of the new Independent Schools Act are available on the independent school website. The changes have impact on how independent schools are administered and require careful monitoring in the implementation of the changes.

This past year has been an exciting year with new challenges and more importantly, new successes. The issue of the review and changes to the BC curriculum had the potential of fragmenting the FISA, but it didn't, and I believe we are a stronger organization for having had the discussion. In addition to the political issues that will arise next year, *The Road Ahead* document will provide the FISA with many topics for discussion. I look forward to another year in the growth of the Federation and I thank each of you for sharing in the vision and contributing to the intellectual capacity of the organization. In particular, my thanks to Barbara Emmerson, Ben Karmel, and Morian Perepelitza who have resigned from the Board to pursue their vocations.


